How to Support Students with Working Memory Limitations

We all can recall a time when we sat in class listening to a teacher who spoke too quickly, was too disorganized for us to follow, or presented ideas that were too complicated for us to grasp. With our working memory on overdrive, we instantly found ourselves lost and overwhelmed.

Many students with language, attention, and/or executive function weaknesses experience this frustration all day, every day due to underlying working memory limitations.
